President's Message - Laurie Alire

Equal Pay Is a Family Issue - Equal Pay Day — April 17

Women (and some enlightened men) have been pushing for pay equity for as long as I can remember. Haven't we solved that problem yet? Guess what? Inequity remains a significant and persistent threat to the economic vitality of American women and American families. In 2014, women working full time in the United States typically were paid just 79% of what men were paid on average, a gap of 21%. This year on April 17, women will catch up with men on pay the previous year. It's as if they worked for free since January! Equal pay is not simply a women's issue—it's a family issue. Families increasingly rely on women's wages to make ends meet. Between 1967 and 2012, the percentage of mothers who brought home at least a quarter of the family's earnings rose from less than a third (28%) to nearly two-thirds (63%). And at the same time, the structure of what is called a "family" has also changed. A majority of mothers are in the paid labor force, and a growing number of them are responsible for supporting their families. For the 40 percent of working mothers with children under the age of 18 who are their families' sole or primary breadwinner, the gender pay gap can contribute to poor living conditions, poor nutrition, and fewer opportunities for their children. For these women, closing the gender pay gap is vital. What can we do to help? We certainly can support equal pay initiatives in Nevada County and California; we can encourage and mentor girls to better navigate the work world and to expand their educational horizons; we can help women to fully appreciate the talents and capabilities they bring to their jobs; and we can highlight and praise successful local women as role models for up and coming young women. We have also begun to implement AAUW's Strategic Plan, with our identified goals of increasing our visibility in the community and improving the recruitment, retention and involvement of our members. Our new Gracious Helpers program is now functioning; this will allow us to provide help to any member in need of meal, shopping or transportation assistance. Feedback from all the girls and their families regarding the application process has been excellent! An offshoot of this interest has been the establishment of a one-day workshop for middle schoolers who have an interest in STEM subjects which will be held at Nevada Union High School on April 2. In addition, AAUW will be awarding a re-entry scholarship to a qualified former student from our area who would like to earn a certificate or degree in a program which would provide training in a vocation.

Exciting things are happening. Applicants for the five available scholarships are being reviewed by our subcommittees. As is often the case, we have so many outstanding applicants to consider, it will be difficult to pick only four high school graduates and one Sierra College student.

In the meantime, thanks to all the work previously done on this front, the Local Scholarship Committee is about to re-institute the re-entry scholarship/grant. This scholarship/grant would be available to those women who left their educational pursuits for family or any other reason and wish to go back to school. This is an important sector of women that we've recently been missing. Returning to school may mean a variety of things. To some it may mean an associate degree, to others a certificate in a particular field, and to some it may mean a bachelor degree. In many cases, the woman may begin by pursuing a certificate then continuing on for a college degree. This scholarship/grant may be available to any of these women. The exact parameters of the scholarship/grant have yet to be determined, but we are happy to report the proposal has the unanimous consent of the board. We will keep you apprised of the progress on this project.

In future we may be able to expand our program to include other kinds of services and support.

LEGAL ADVOCACY FUND

Discrimination is still common in women's athletics. Women's sports have come a long way since the passage of Title IX in 1972, but a current case in Tennessee demonstrates that there is still need to stay vigilant.

Moshak v. University of Tennessee was filed in 2012 by 3 employees who were forced out of their jobs in the women's athletic department, alleging unlawful discrimination. They argue that they were fired after making internal complaints alleging unequal pay between the men's and women's departments. They say the university merged the two departments which led to termination of 86% of the positions in the women's department.

Although Equity in athletics wasn't a primary goal of Title IX, the gains have been some of the most widely recognized example of gender equity success. Since Title IX was passed more than 40 years ago, women's participation in college sports has increased more than 600 percent.

Now for more good news, dated January 2016. The plaintiffs in the above case successfully settled their case against the University. It will pay more than \$1 Million as part of the settlement agreement/ AAUW is thrilled for the plaintiffs and proud to have supported their case. You can be too, your financial contributions enabled cases such as this to occur.

Happy Spring everyone! Big changes are in store for our Save Mart Shares rewards cards. Every time you shop and give the clerk your Shares card or phone #, up to 3% of the proceeds are credited to our Educational Opportunity Fund which provides fellowships and grants to deserving women. In the past SaveMart issued a rewards card which you presented at the check stand, In the new eScrip system you will use your phone number on a key pad to accrue your rewards. The change that begins on April 1st is that rather than using a Shares card, our EOF donations will be linked to your rewards, which is linked into your phone number and eScrip.

Here are the instructions, but note that apparently Kindle does not work for this:

Go to www.escrip.com/savemart .(with your left hand hold down the control key and with your right hand place your mouse on this email address and click).

1. If you already have eScrip and a SaveMart card, you may have gotten an e-mail from SaveMart saying that said you need to update your account. If so, follow the prompts. You simply select Phone Number rather than SaveMart on the drop down box, then type in your phone number in the right hand box and click Add. Because your phone number is linked to SaveMart and eScrip, you have already selected **NevCoBranch Educational Foundation as your designee**. It is all you need to do. Don't use Kindle as it doesn't work and can't do as much as a computer can, so hopefully the use of the computer by our members will get them where they need to go.
2. If you do not have eScrip, then click the Sign Up box. Its pretty clear how to sign up. They need personal info plus email. Zip code and phone#. The phone# is how eScrip will know how to credit the reward. You must click or write in **AAUW NevCoBranch Educational Foundation in** order to get the rewards.
3. If you do not have access to a computer you will need to either access a friend's computer or go into the store to get help..
4. If all else fails, you can call 1-800-692-5710 for SaveMart customer support help.

I need to emphasize how important it is for you to make this change! This is a major source of our EOF income and the bulk of it comes from Save Mart, rather than SPD. Thank you for taking the time to make this change to benefit women and girls and the entire world, who benefits from these educated women and their groundbreaking research.


