President's Message...

Dear AAUW - Nevada County Branch Members,

Like all of you, we on our AAUW Branch Board are deeply concerned about the spread and the impact of COVID-19 on our community, the nation, and the world. As you know, the effects from a widespread health issue can be severely crippling economically, too.

You may wonder what AAUW National is doing. Here is what they wrote on the national website, "We in the national AAUW office are taking several precautions to ensure the safety of our staff and with all we engage on behalf of our AAUW mission. As the situation is evolving rapidly, we've put in place operational changes to ensure AAUW can continue to move forward on its mission. **We want to share that AAUW is closing the physical office and moving all employees to mandatory telework status through Friday, March 27.** All of our employees are also encouraged to follow CDC recommendations and take precautions, which can be effective at helping the spread of the virus, as well as the flu and colds. Information and guidance is available from the [World Health Organization](#) and [Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.](#)"



Our Branch Board continues to work in real time to determine the safest and most prudent decisions to protect the health of our speakers, our Branch members, and our Nevada County community. We canceled the March 21st General Meeting and we may need to change to virtual General Meetings for a while and cancel face-to-face Board meetings and substitute video conference calls. We will keep you informed, of course. Please watch your emails for any communication from our Board.

As we reflect on our greater mission at AAUW, it's also important to think about the impact of the coronavirus for those Americans who can't afford to take time away from work, get the healthcare that they need, or deal with unexpected childcare challenges. Currently, at least 34 million private sector workers — nearly 1/3 of the workforce — don't have access to paid sick days. That is simply unacceptable. AAUW has long advocated for policies, like the Healthy Families Act, that protect and support all workers, ensuring that everyone can take care of themselves and their loved ones without the fear of a lost paycheck or retaliation from their boss. But we're also advocating for real-time solutions to deal with emergency situations, such as the just-introduced Paid Sick Days for Public Health Emergencies and Personal and Family Care Act. These policies are needed now more than ever, and AAUW will continue to champion this fight. For women, who often act as primary caregivers, the inability to earn paid sick days can have particularly devastating consequences. No working woman should be forced to make the choice between going to work contagious or missing a paycheck.


These are trying times in more ways than one. They are also perfect opportunities to support each other. Please stay well, be kind to one another, and know that your AAUW Board is available and thinking of you.

AAUW FUND



This month I would like to focus on the Economic Security Fund, intended to ensure livelihoods for women working toward equal pay, providing salary negotiation training, and deepening women's retirement security and quality of life. One of the most important programs under this umbrella is the Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF). LAF fights in court to support AAUW's mission. AAUW has recently filed two new Amicus briefs to support women fighting for equal pay. *Freyd v. University of Oregon* supports Professor Jennifer Freyd, a respected senior faculty member in the Psychology Department who is paid significantly less than many of her male colleagues. She has argued that this is a violation of the Equal Pay Act and Oregon's sex discrimination law. Professor Freyd lost in federal District Court and has filed an appeal with the 9th District Court of Appeals, arguing that "substantially equal work" should result in equal pay. AAUW has joined this important battle. The other recent AAUW Amicus brief filed is the *National Women's Law Center v. Office of Management and Budget (OMB)*. This litigation seeks to compel the OMB to allow the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) to continue to collect salary data, a project started under the Obama Administration. The current administration's Office of Management and Budget has been attempting to stop this effort. Plaintiffs include Jenny Yang, former Chair of the EEOC during the Obama administration. How do you negotiate and fight for equal pay if you don't know what other employees are earning? This data collection should not be derailed! Women still make only 82% of what men make in this country, even though they generally have more education. Let's keep up the good fight for equal pay! Support AAUW Fund's Economic Security Fund to help in these efforts.



Looking Ahead: Membership Directory Overhaul

We've been kicking a few ideas around about making improvements in facilitating (modernizing) communications among members. Among those ideas is improving the Membership Directory by reducing its size, concentrating its content on member contact info, but still covering general meetings, current officers, and interest groups. In making sure we don't lose what's currently included, we'll use our Branch website to take over some of what's found in the Directory's last section.



Here's the reasoning behind the change:

Over the last few years AAUW's directory has undergone a number of updates which include:

- Elimination of vendor ads in the center (now on the Branch website)
- Reduction of white space throughout, including removal of separator lines between members' contact/information blocks

These changes have made the directory easier to peruse and less bulky to store. In line with these changes, it was suggested (by a member, you know who you are!) that the directory could be further improved by reducing its size. A smaller booklet would fit more easily in a purse, tote, a car's glove compartment or jockey box. But a smaller booklet, on the other hand, necessitates a reduction in content, eliminating all the back section, some of which already exists on the AAUW Nevada County Branch website.

We are addressing that last issue by making our Branch website vital, up-to-date, and a place for information you'll want to visit. Please stay tuned.....we will discuss the compelling changes in our Branch website in the NEXT *Lodestone*!

At the time this issue of the Lodestone was ready for distribution, the process for voting to accept this slate of officers had not been finalized. Because of the constraints from Covid-19, we will be contacting you and requesting a response to accepting the slate soon. Thank you for your patience.

Voter Protection for Free and Fair 2020 Elections



Ever since the 2018 mid-term elections, only moderate attention has been given to the unfair, and sometimes illegal, voting suppression that occurred and its ongoing threat to our democracy.


The League of Women Voters, LWV, predicts much more of what we saw then. In Ohio alone, 2 million eligible voters were purged from the voting rolls between 2011 and 2018, and in 2019 the Supreme Court upheld this voter purge system. Last summer the Supreme Court failed to take a stand for voters and set clear standards for partisan gerrymandering.

Shortly after women got the right to vote, the LWV was formed to help newly enfranchised women exercise their voting rights. The 100-year-old organization is now our country’s primary agent and recourse for stopping these suppression tactics. Their proven strategies include legal challenges, registering voters, and a very big campaign to naturalize foreign-born residents so they can vote by November. Their VOTE411.org website provided nonpartisan election and candidate information to more than 5 million people. And, of course, they will continue to educate millions in 2020.

The League of Women Voters urgently needs our support. The partisan operatives are doing all they can to erect barriers to the ballot box, such as eliminating poll places and voting by mail.

Local Scholarships



Gracious Helpers

As most of you know, Gracious Helpers is an Interest Group made up of members who provide meals for other members who might need some help. The recipient or spouse/partner might have had surgery or an illness. We use Meal Train which is a website that allows us to put in our member's information. The information usually states the day and time when they would like the meal, and it allows us to put in any necessary information on the type of food which they prefer. The meals are not anything difficult and, in one instance, was only a sandwich. We put in the location and phone number of the recipient. Therefore, the provider can contact the recipient to discuss the delivery. In addition, the website has a calendar which we use to schedule the meals, so everyone knows what days are being covered. Finally, the person in charge of the website has the ability to send out a mass letter to all the providers to let them know of the recipient and a way for them to easily get back to the pages with the calendar and information. It is quite a remarkable website, and it's free at this point. Because of the family tragedy that Cheryl experienced this past Christmas, Pat Pedersen is taking over as the person in charge. If you know of anyone who might need our assistance, please contact Pat. We always are ready to help each other.
