Wildfire Threat: Building Resistance in the Sierra Nevada

We are pleased to bring you programs in October and November that highlight two critical issues in our region...fire and water.

This month we welcome Brittany Covich with the Sierra

Nevada Conservancy (SNC). Brittany serves as SNC's Policy and Outreach Division Chief.

Did you know that the Sierra Nevada -Cascade area, which is supported by SNC's work, includes 60% of the state's animal species and that 75% percent of the state relies on this region for fresh drinking water? Yet vast swaths of this area are at high fire risk putting animal species and fresh drinking water supplies in jeopardy.

At the October 21 program, we will hear how the SNC is helping to reduce wildfire risk, protect biodiversity and improve recreation access. Brittany will also tell us about the SNC's role in helping restore lands when wildfires occur. Lastly, we'll hear about their support of cutting-edge scientific research projects and how they are using regional knowledge to advance forest management strategies.

This exciting presentation will be followed in November with a look at our regional water supply. Nevada Irrigation District Board (NID) Directors Karen Hull and Ricki Heck will explain how our changing climate is influencing the way NID is planning for the future. More to come on this engaging program in next month's Lodestone.

AAUW CA Public Policy and the Woman Card

Advancing Gender Equity is Advancing Environmental Sustainability (and vice versa)

After a year of wild weather in California, many of us may be thinking more about climate, environment, and sustainability. How does our concern with the weather relate to AAUW
California's Public Policy Priorities? Advancing gender equity is directly related to environmental sustainability. The inverse is also true.

The <u>United Nations sustainable development</u> goals, adopted in 2015, seek to push all countries to act to protect the planet, ensure widespread prosperity, and promote peace. Achieving gender equality, goal number five, is a crucial element in this overall strategy.

We know that <u>having greater gender diversity in</u> <u>leadership</u> improves organizations. One of AAUW California's public policy focus areas is increasing women in leadership positions. However,

we can see how sustainable development goal 5, promoting greater gender equality, alongside advancing AAUW California's public policy priorities, can be important for achieving sustainable development goal 13, creating more impactful climate action.

Data also shows us that (un)sustainable production and consumption patterns, which harm the environment, tend to be gendered, with "green" choices being widely feminized. While this is a global trend, we see this in popular portrayals of more planet-friendly consumption choices in the United States, as well, such as veganism, which tends to be marked as more "feminine" and less "masculine." This example shows us that sustainable development goal 5, promoting greater gender equality, alongside AAUW California's overall public policy mission of advancing equity for women and girls, is also important for achieving sustainable development goal 12, which focuses on creating more planet-friendly and responsible production and consumption patterns.



Advancing gender equity is directly related to environmental sustainability, and vice versa. In advancing AAUW California's public policy goals, and expanding the rights of all women and girls, we can help create the conditions for greater justice and inclusion, economic parity, and environmental viability, all at the same time.

advancing this goal can also have positive climate impacts. The UN has found that having greater gender diversity in climate discussions leads to improved outcomes on climate-focused policies and projects. This is just one case in which

Make their day – and yours: AAUW's Holiday Service Projects

We have an opportunity to help others with the most basic, important need of all: food for those without. As Sue Van Son explained at the Welcome Back Brunch, the extent of local food insecurity became evident during a Great Decisions focused on global famine. Participants wondered what the local reality was, how many in our county experienced food insecurity. The answer is shocking: twenty-one percent of Nevada County residents reported not having enough to eat (CalMatters, July 2020).

Who are these people? They are working families, senior citizens, veterans, and people from all walks of life. Without Interfaith Food Ministry (IFM), the Food Bank and other supportive agencies, they would not know where their next meal is coming from. In 2022, IFM served over 9500 people, including 5229 children and seniors.

IFM distributes food to about 1200 families within a two-week period, supported by 400 volunteers and by the community—by farmers and grocers, and by many generous donors. For the holidays, IMF plans to provide each family with a special meal, but they can only do that with community help. That's where we come in.

Got some spare change?

Help provide 100 holiday gift bags with treats to be distributed to home-bound individuals receiving food delivery through the FoodBank,





...and make the holiday a little brighter by sharing.

Bring your spare change to Branch meetings in October & November. Each one of us can sponsor a family's holiday meal with a donation of \$25. That's it—an entire meal including a turkey or ham, potatoes, a vegetable, soup, and cranberry sauce for just twenty-five bucks. Can you spare that much? Maybe you'll sponsor two



families, or four, or give some meals as a gift in someone's name. Whatever your budget allows will be welcomed. Give till it feels good, and make the holidays brighter for yourself while you cheer others.
