Food Insecurity



With the Thanksgiving holiday around the corner, we are often reminded that many families do not have the means to eat regular healthy meals. But what many do not realize is that we are currently facing an increase in the need for donations while the current donations are decreasing. The Interfaith Food Ministry (IFM) says they're seeing record numbers of people applying for food assistance. Approximately 10-15% (10,000+) of Nevada County residents are food insecure; that is, they do not have consistent access to enough food for every person in a household to live an active, healthy life.

The focus of our November 16 program is food insecurity – what that means, how it is being addressed, who are in need, and how we can help. AAUW member **Sue Van Son** has organized an excellent program to more fully understand the scope of this humanitarian issue. With her expertise as a former director of the IFM, she has organized and will moderate a panel of speakers who are experts on food insecurity in our region. They are as follows (Leslie, Phil & Julie pictured left to right below):

- Leslie Lovejoy, Executive Director of Gold Country Senior Services, which operates Meals on Wheels and runs a new senior center
- Phil Alonso, Executive Director of Interfaith Food Ministry, with Development Director Victoria Lindsay, and Operations Manager Venus Paxton
- Julie Thornbury, Executive Director of the Food Bank of Nevada County, with Heather Haddock, Volunteer and Outreach Coordinator

These panelists will address such topics as: the scope of food insecurity, gaps between these organizations' missions and the challenges to fulfilling them, how demand for food is increasing, the demographics of those in need, and the various ways to involve the community. Sue will also tell us how we can help and the plans afoot for AAUW's participation in the Holiday Service Project with food donations to families over the coming holidays.

President's Message

How Can AAUW be Non-Partisan AND Politically Active?

As this Lodestone issue arrives, the national election will soon be concluded. This election has been a tough one. I will not miss the constant polling and contentious political conversations (mostly with my mother). This seems a relevant time to review AAUW's stance on political activism. Even a brief review of AAUW national and state websites, confirms that AAUW advocates for political issues and specific policies relevant to women and girls. Topics include support for Title IX, education, gender equity, and ending bullying and discrimination in schools. In some cases, these supported issues disproportionally impact women. For example, women hold two-thirds of the country's student debt; therefore, AAUW promotes legislation to make college more affordable. AAUW's political stance is detailed in two-minute activism briefs, policy updates, and voter guides. Building on a history of political activism, the AAUW tagline reads "We are tenacious and trailblazing women, advocating for women and girls since 1881 and into the future."

In contrast, a recent AAUW policy brief notes that AAUW does not permit partisan activities. The brief states "Put simply, being political is a way to influence legislation and regulation through governmental or public affairs, while partisan activities have a firm adherence to a party, faction, or purpose." This position seeks bi-partisan agreement on issues that strengthen women and girls, without backing specific partisan candidates.



Endorsement of non-partisan (no party designation) candidates is a grey area. Some AAUW branches adhere to the non-partisan caveat in the broadest sense; no AAUW endorsement of any candidate, whether or not a party (partisan) designation is identified. Other AAUW branches vet potential nonpartisan candidates with a thorough process prior to endorsement. Most

Public Policy News

Policy, not Politics, What AAUW Supports

Here we are at the beginning of November. This incredibly consequential election is on November 5th. As I write this article, I have no idea what the outcome will be. You likely have already voted by the time you read this.

I cannot recommend a candidate or a political party, but I can say electing women leaders is extremely important. One of the major AAUW Public Policy Priorities is increased representation of women in leadership roles. A mantra that has shaped generations of women in politics is "The personal is political". As an AAUW member, you can understand that statement. We are fighting for women's reproductive choice, equal rights and protections against harassment in schools and colleges, and equal opportunity and pay in the workplace. Let's celebrate an early leader who embodied that mantra, Shirley Chisholm. Her legacy is one of groundbreaking firsts. The first Black woman in Congress and the first woman to seek the presidential nomination. Chisholm challenged the political status quo. Her unapologetic advocacy for women's rights, people of color and people experiencing poverty embodied the idea that personal experiences and identities shape political action. Chisholm famously said, "If they don't give you a seat at the table, bring a folding chair." Her determination continues to inspire women to claim their rightful place in politics, serving as an example of hope and encouragement for generations to come. So, ladies, no matter what, we will keep on fighting for women's rights!

GOOD NEWS

AAUW-CA has done quite well with the 2024 Legislative Agenda. The Governor has signed 16 of the AAUW supported bills into law. I am really excited to tell you that all three AAUW-CA "A" priority bills have been signed into law. These are the bills that we presented to legislators on Lobby Day in Sacramento, back in April:

AB 2843 – "Health Care Coverage for Rape and Sexual Assault Survivors" – AAUW CA authored and sponsored this bill that requires insurers to cover the cost of medical care following a rape or sexual assault with no copay.

AB 2326 – "Title IX Oversight and Compliance Act" – AAUW CA also sponsored this bill which will require Chancellors/ Presidents of community colleges, CSU and UC to


colleges, CSU and UC to publicly and orally present an annual report of compliance with Title IX to the Senate and Assembly Budget Subcommittees on Education Finance.

AB 2099 – "Protecting Reproductive Health Clinics" – This bill makes it possible for a District Attorney to file felony charges for posting information about reproductive health care patients or providers with intent to commit a crime if bodily injury results.

BAD NEWS

Project 2025 – I will be attending an October 22 Webinar (after my *Lodestone* deadline) hosted by the Public Policy Committee entitled, "Project 2025 and How It Would Impact AAUW Public Policy Priorities." The webinar will include an overview of where Project 2025 came from, what it is broadly attempting to do, and how it would impact education, Title IX, reproductive health, and gender equity. I will report back to you.

To help protect drivers and machine operators from the dangers of drifting off, engineers at UC Berkeley have created prototype earbuds that can detect the signs of drowsiness in the brain. AAUW Funds includes quite a few programs. Its basic function is to translate our mission into action. It has been named one of the best independent charities in America and remains the largest source of funding exclusively for graduate women. There are four divisions within the umbrella of AAUW FUNDS;

- Education & Training fund (4450)
- Economic Security Fund (4449)
- Leadership Fund (4452)
- Greatest Need Fund (9110)

The numbers in parentheses are used to designate which category you want your donation to go.

In the academic year of 2022-23, AAUW awarded 6 million in fellowships and grants to more than 320 outstanding women and community projects in that.
